MESSAGE FROM BOARD CHAIR & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2016 was a whirlwind of a year! In addition to the downturn in the economy and serving more people in need, Edmonton's Food Bank deployed food and other services within hours of the Fort McMurray evacuation. As we entered 2017, we believed the worst of the economic downturn was over and we would be helping fewer people. How wrong this prediction was! The numbers continued to increase.

In response to this unprecedented demand on our services, we launched Beyond Food (Learning Lab). Beyond Food exists because of the leadership and co-operation of community partners: Boyle Street Community Services, The Learning Centre, Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers, Bissell Centre, BGS Enterprises, the City of Edmonton and Canadian Mental Health Association. Services at Beyond Food include free safety tickets such as construction & first aid, resume development, job interview practice, budgeting support and one-on-one support. While Edmonton's Food Bank continues to do an excellent job with food programs, these organizations are able to provide core services to help people towards independence. By offering programs like Beyond Food in partnership with such community groups the Food Bank is helping to find solutions to the problem of hunger.

Although the hustle and bustle of 2017 is now a memory, we would be remiss if we did not recognize the amazing contribution made by our volunteers and staff to help us feed hungry Edmontonians. We are proud to share that in 2017, our volunteers contributed 85,126 hours to the organization. Our volunteers and staff make it possible to coordinate over 2,200 annual fundraising events, collect, sort, repackage and redistribute approximately 4 million kilograms of food per year, provide nearly 500,000 meals and snacks every month through affiliated agencies, including 59 schools, and serve over 22,000 people each month through our hamper programs. We are grateful for the generosity of our supporters, for without your kindness we would not be able to assist those who rely on our services.

Presented by the Board of Directors, Edmonton's Food Bank proudly unveiled our new list of values which govern the manner in which we interact with each other, stakeholders and the greater community. Our values are the things that we believe are important in the way that we operate. These values are: Service, Commitment, Responsiveness, Innovation, Integrity and Fairness.

At Edmonton's Food Bank, we look forward to meeting the challenges that 2018 will bring. While uncertainty exists surrounding the economy, the job market, cost of living, food expenses and other factors, we are confident in our ability to support our neighbors in need. It is because of your support through food, funds and friendship that we are able to take on the challenge.

EDMONTON'S FOOD BANK

The Edmonton Gleaners Association, more commonly known as Edmonton's Food Bank, was incorporated in 1981 and was the first Food Bank in Canada. Edmonton's Food Bank primarily operates as a central warehouse distributing food to over 250 agencies, churches, schools, and food depots throughout the city to support their programs. Thanks to this consolidated effort, we ensure that food donations go directly to those who need it the most. Since September 2014, Edmonton's Food Bank has seen a remarkable increase in need within our community. Our hamper program recipients have risen to over 22,000 people per month and our meal and snack programs have increased to nearly 500,000 meals and snacks each month. Over 40% of our clients are children under the age of 18. As the city changes, so do we. In our 35 years of operation, Edmonton's Food Bank has evolved into a very efficient and very passionate group dedicated to eliminating the hunger problem in our city.

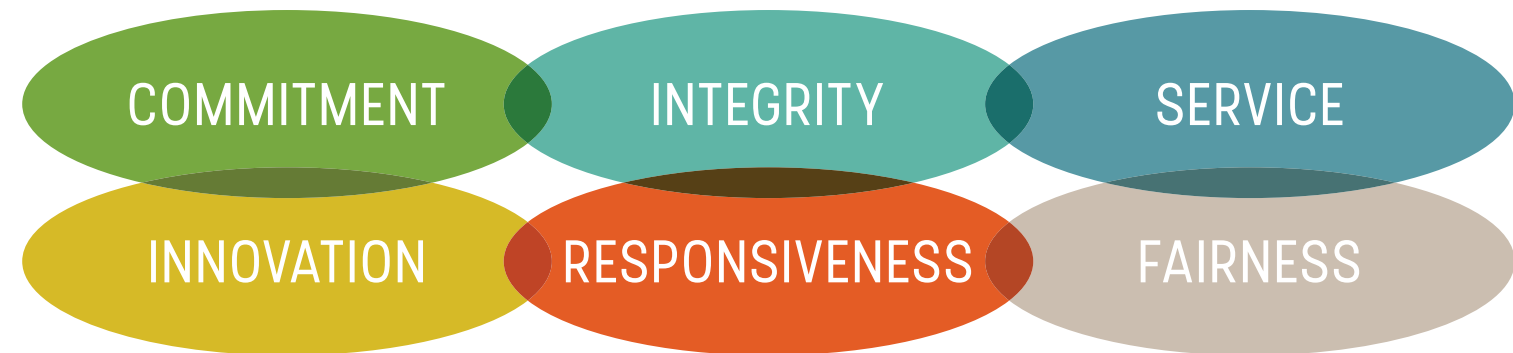
To be stewards in the collection of surplus and donated food for the effective distribution, free of charge to people in need in our community, while seeking solutions to the causes of hunger.

MAIN WAREHOUSE

Edmonton's Food Bank was a hub of activity in 2017. Through the efforts of our valued volunteers and staff, it was a powerhouse of collecting, sorting, repackaging, and redistributing. More than 4 million kilograms (8,818,490 lbs) of food with a value of approximately \$22,175,000 has come and gone through our doors. It is important to keep in mind that approximately 60%-80% of the food that we distribute is gleaned from the Retail Food Program and Food Industry Partners.

Food donations go to one of our multiple programs to support our community and ensure food is equitably distributed. Our programs are designed to meet the needs of the general community as well as unique groups, such as, pork free, diabetic and celiac friendly. Additionally, we glean perishable and non-perishable foods from various types of food establishments in the community.

► Hamper Programs

Established in 1985 as a means to increase the accessibility of services for our clients, our hampers are distributed at an ever-increasing number of food depots throughout Edmonton. Assembled in our warehouse, a hamper is a box of food that consists of perishable and non-perishable food products, the majority of which are gleaned from the food industry. Each hamper is assembled according to the number of individuals it is intended to feed (i.e. the number of adults, children, and infants in the household). Clients may request accommodation for special dietary needs (i.e. celiac, diabetic, vegetarian, etc.) or request additional resources such as pet food, school snack items, and toiletries, when available.

► Agency Partnerships

We are fortunate to work with many agencies and other non-profit organizations to provide meals and snacks in our community. These services include breakfast and meal programs, based on our partners' capabilities and the needs of their clients. Each month, we work with our partners to distribute nearly 500,000 meals and snacks. This collaborative effort to reduce hunger in our community is inspiring and appreciated.

► School Snack Programs

Edmonton's Food Bank provided 59 schools with approximately 32,266 nutritious snacks per week as part of our School Snack Program in 2017. Edmonton's Food Bank is committed to providing a variety of healthy snack items for children. We target-purchase snacks that are found on Alberta Health Services' single serving list in accordance with the Alberta Nutrition Guidelines for Children and Youth, such as low sodium and no sugar added choices.



The Retail Food Program

GLEANNING

Many are not aware that Edmonton's Food Bank began as a gleaning operation collecting surplus food from Edmonton's food industry for people in need.

This food is considered surplus (or waste) for a variety of reasons including packaging changes, damaged exterior packaging, and over shipment or overstocking by the store. Today gleaning is captured in our Retail Food Program and it remains a vital part of our services with approximately 80% of the food we distribute coming from the food industry. By including both non-perishable and perishable foods (including fresh fruit, vegetables, dairy products, and bread) this program helps us provide a greater variety of food to more people while reducing the impact of unnecessary waste in our landfill.

Edmonton's Food Bank is partnered with several corporate retail food donors, including: Safeway, Sobeys, IGA, Save On Foods, Co-op, Sysco, Walmart, MacDonald's Consolidated, Superstore, No Frills, Blush Lane Organic, Organic Box, The Grocery People, Planet Organic, London Drugs, Edmonton Potato Growers, Little Potato Company, Saputo, Spectrum, VersaCold, Wallace and Carey, TCL Supply Chain Inc., Excel Logistics, J&S Food Service, Agro/Lucerne, Trans-X, and Stericycle.

How We Build

FOOD HAMPERS



► Every hamper starts out with staple, non-perishable food items, such as pasta, soup, beans and canned fruit and vegetables.



► Items added next vary depending on available food products that have been donated or gleaned from the food industry, including fresh produce, yogurt, cereals, baked goods, etc.



► Edmonton's Food Bank often receives donated food in bulk quantities. Food Bank volunteers repackage these items into individual or family sized portions, which are then added to the hampers.



► Included in every hamper are fresh eggs. Edmonton's Food Bank purchases these eggs in bulk and volunteers repackage them by the dozen into donated egg cartons. The egg bill for 2017 was a staggering \$228,974 for 106,560 dozen eggs.

Keeping Our Perishables Cool

WALK-IN COOLER & FREEZER

With the increased need for our services, additional cooler and freezer storage is essential. A new 13 foot cooler and modifications to refurbish an old cooler into a freezer began December 2015 and by mid-January 2016, both were fully operational. Special thanks to the Edmonton Community Foundation and the Stollery Charitable Foundation for helping us complete this monumental addition to our services.

Given our relationship with the Shaw Family, it is important that we acknowledge the passing of Jim Shaw. Jim Shaw joined the company his father founded, Shaw Communications, as a cable installer and eventually became CEO, helping grow the company's revenue from \$646 million to \$3.7 billion during his tenure. During his time with the company, he was involved in launching its foray into the internet, digital cable and its purchase of 11 radio stations and seven TV channels from Rogers. He was also known for his philanthropic work across Canada.

We have been well supported by the Shaw Family and are truly saddened by Jim's passing. We would like to extend our sincere condolences to Jim's family, friends and to everyone at Shaw.



THE ANNEX

With a staggering 64.4% increase in the use of our services since 2013, Edmonton's Food Bank found we were quickly running out of space. The Annex played a key role in enabling Edmonton's Food Bank to grow to meet the pressing demands on our services. Purchased in 2014, Edmonton's Food Bank Annex is located two doors south of our main warehouse. When Dean Hengel of Hockey Edmonton remarked that calling the new space "Warehouse 2" didn't properly describe the beautifully renovated building, and that it was more of an "Annex" of the main Food Bank, the name stuck.

Our pride in the Annex begins with the design of the exterior which was completed by Landscape Architect, Ryan Doram. The green space, mulch flower beds, native grasses and trees that surround the building contribute to the welcoming environment of the Annex.

Initially the building was used as dry food storage, but renovations completed with the help of HIBCO Construction evolved the Annex into the beautiful office and meeting space it is today. The Annex is a space that hosts Food Bank volunteer orientations, operates a Saturday food depot and provides office space for WECAN Food Basket Society. In the Annex a variety of classes and workshops are available through a new program rightly named "Beyond Food". Also, our Resource Development and Client Services departments call the space home and non-profits, schools and other organizations are encouraged to hold meetings, information sessions, and seminars in what is truly a community centre.



A new program that goes

BEYOND FOOD

Beyond Food is a new community partnership initiated by Edmonton's Food Bank that brings together the strengths of five community agencies and the City of Edmonton to offer a range of services that are helping Edmontonians survive the economic downturn.

Beyond Food opened its doors mid-November 2017 at Edmonton's Food Bank Annex building at 11434 – 120 Street. Available services include resume preparation, job interview practice, job search assistance and help securing safety tickets.

The partners include Boyle Street Community Services, Bissell Centre, Canadian Mental Health Association, City of Edmonton, Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers and The Learning Centre.

In addition to employment readiness services, Beyond Food offers English and Math upgrading, budgeting advice, personal counselling and information about affordable housing.

Since its opening, about 80 community members have used the free service. The program works on a drop-in basis and is available without an appointment, Monday to Friday from 9 am to 4 pm.

Says Marjorie Bencz, "There is more work for us to do to connect with city employers and expand our staffing resources, but we have had a good start and look forward to addressing the unmet needs of the people we serve."



Canadian Pride

TED FLOWER


Raised west of Edmonton in rural Alberta, Ted Flower started creating art with ballpoint pens at the age of 12. As money was scarce, Mr. Flower was unable to access any formal training to develop his unique interest and skill. However, despite lacking formal training, Ted diligently refined his skill, setting aside whatever time he could spare to work on his art. Ted Flower's "Canadian Pride" will create a lasting legacy of the artist's role in celebrating Canada's 150th birthday. It is through his determination and passion that Edmontonians and people from all around the world get to take in the incredible piece.

Mr. Flower generously donated the sale and any reproductions of "Canadian Pride" to Edmonton's Food Bank to help in their effort to ensure that individuals and families have access to nutritious and appropriate food in an atmosphere of dignity and respect.

"Canadian Pride" took Mr. Flower five-and-a-half years to complete (3,712 hours), using 115 ballpoint pens. It was on display in the Edmonton, Calgary and Ottawa Airports in 2017 and was returned to hang at the Edmonton International Airport by the international baggage carousels (January 2018).

CLIENT STORIES

In 2017, Edmonton's Food Bank helped 64,080 people through our hamper programs. Edmonton's Food Bank is here to help during a particularly difficult month or for a longer time frame. It's important to remember that these people in need are our neighbours, elders, classmates, co-workers and children. Because of the generous support from our community, we are able to help our neighbours in need.

A week before Christmas an elderly woman contacted Edmonton's Food Bank. She was concerned that someone had fraudulently used her name to access the Food Bank and feared that she would be denied food when she needed it most. The volunteer assisting her ensured her that she would be getting a food hamper. During the intake process, the volunteer mentioned that the woman would also receive a ham and a few other festive trimmings for Christmas. After a pause, it was apparent that the woman had started to cry. She was so grateful for the festive hamper and the added treats helped make her Christmas a bit brighter.

Deborah is a single woman in Edmonton who lost her job early in 2017. She had enough money from EI to pay her rent, utilities, and transportation; however, little was left over for groceries. Instead of choosing to forgo bus tickets to get to job interviews, she contacted Edmonton's Food Bank for help. Deborah has recently called to let us know she secured a full time job, and to say how thankful she was for the food provided to her over the past year. Thanks to donations like yours, we were able to help Deborah.

A young mother of two boys called requesting a food hamper at the beginning of December. This family had just lost their home to a fire and didn't have adequate insurance. Struggling to make ends meet, the young mother who had just lost everything, feared she wouldn't have much of a Christmas for her boys; however, with the food and small gifts our volunteers were able to find, she was able to provide something special for them. She was very grateful and repeated "Thank you" over and over. Because of your gift, this family is feeling supported and hopeful during their difficult time.

A young father of two was injured in a car accident. With a broken neck, he's been unable to work at his job as a crane operator. As a result, he had to access the Food Bank several times until insurance money arrived. Receiving a food hamper relieved a lot of this father's stress and anxiety around providing food for his children. "A little food can go a long way", he says.

When offered a turkey at Christmas, Krystan said, "That's so kind! Thank you. My kids would love a turkey! Thank you for all the hard work you put in each day helping people like my family. The holidays are a hard time for many, and you help to make it better for them. Thank you!"

"Thank you for everything! We got green beans and even though the kids did not like them, we have put them in almost everything except cereal and ice cream. We have gotten onions and tomatoes – lots of them, and froze them." Because of your donations, we were able to help Jai and her family.

Just before Christmas a young lady called the Food Bank in tears. Her husband kicked her and their three children out of the house with only the clothes on their backs. When she contacted the Food Bank, we told her to come in as soon as possible. Along with a food hamper, the Food Bank was able to provide her with several different resource numbers to contact for assistance with shelter, clothes and support. Thanks to your donations this family received some comfort during a very challenging time.

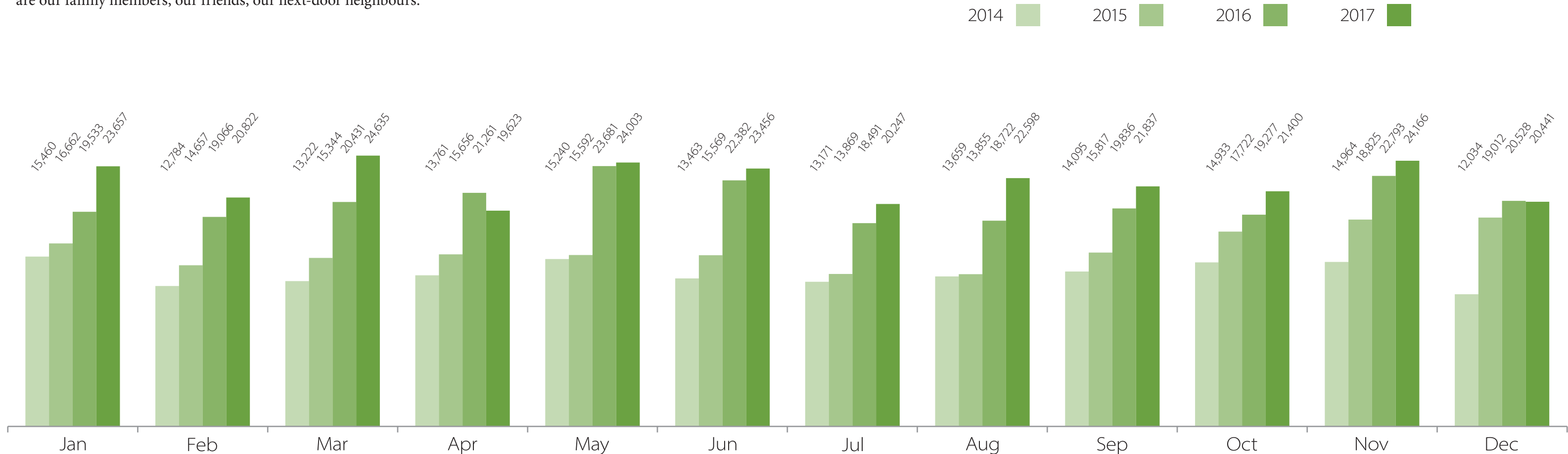
INCREASING NUMBERS

Edmonton's Food Bank is lucky to have many volunteers who see lending a hand to help those in need as integral to their lives. One such person is Margaret French, a Client Services volunteer. "It makes me feel like I'm contributing," says the retiree, of her role helping clients get food hampers.

Margaret began volunteering with the Food Bank three years ago and now spends two to four hours each weekday looking after online hamper orders. The Food Bank now gets between 30 and 50 online hamper orders each weekday. Margaret goes through about 40 requests per shift, checking to make sure client information matches our records, matching clients with a hamper depot in their neighbourhood and sending out an offer to have a hamper ready for them to pick up. She is a dedicated volunteer who sees volunteering as a wonderful way to spend her time during retirement. "It gives me structure," she says, adding with a laugh, "I always said I'd get a job at Timmies for the coffee but they have coffee here."

Margaret says the fact that she is still volunteering with the Food Bank is a testament to the staff who she finds very supportive. It is something she has not experienced as a volunteer with some other organizations. When she comes in to the Food Bank she is treated like one of the staff, joking and laughing along with her colleagues. When asked what she would tell people about volunteering for the Food Bank she says, "There are so many areas to volunteer in and it feels good."

Edmonton's Food Bank is lucky to have volunteers like Margaret who see helping others as an important and fulfilling way to spend their time.



Volunteer Team Profile

VINTAGE HOCKEY GROUP

Edmonton's Food Bank has many groups that commit to volunteering regularly in our warehouse. One of these groups is the Edmonton Vintage Hockey Group, which started after Vintage Hockey member Jim Knull volunteered at the Food Bank with his employer RBC. Jim thought it would be a wonderful team experience for their group. The members agreed and have been bringing a group of 10-15 people six times a year since the 2012 season.

The group, whose average age is 68, comes in for two hours in the evening and helps in a variety of ways – from sorting food donations to helping set up the Food Bank's Harvest Luncheon. The group also held a food drive at their tournament in December 2017 and collected 220 kilograms of food. The group enjoys volunteering at the Food Bank and meeting other like-minded people. When asked why the group continues to volunteer and support Edmonton's Food Bank, Jim said, "They understand the line between using and not using [the Food Bank]. When you can give back, you do."

Edmonton's Food Bank is grateful for the support of dedicated and community minded volunteers like the Edmonton Vintage Hockey Group.

Red Hat Co-operative

GROWERS GIVE BACK

In 2017 southern Alberta's Red Hat Co-operative supported food banks in a big way by developing the "Growers Give Back Pack". Across western Canada for each pack sold at Sobeys, Safeway and IGA one was donated to the local food bank. The packs were filled with tomatoes, bell peppers and cucumbers, all grown in the 180 acres of greenhouses belonging to Co-operative members. By the end of the campaign Edmonton's Food Bank received 113,399 kilograms of fresh Alberta grown produce.



Holiday Giving

CBC TURKEY DRIVE

The CBC Turkey Drive has helped Edmonton's Food Bank make the holiday season hunger free for thousands in our community since 1995. Thanks to the generous donations of CBC listeners, the 2017 CBC Turkey Drive raised \$556,199. We were able to supply agencies with over 2050 turkeys and ingredients to provide over 19,300 people with festive meals. Additionally, we are able to add turkeys or hams to hampers for individuals and families over the holiday season. The continued success of this event is owed to the year-round efforts of the amazing group of volunteers who help with promotions and share stories of the impact that a donated turkey has – stories of hope.



SERVUS HERITAGE FESTIVAL

Edmonton is a city brimming with cultural diversity, as it is home to people from all around the world. Every August, Edmontonians gather in William Hawrelak Park over the three-day-long Heritage Festival weekend to celebrate this diversity, indulging in all the fascinating aromas, tastes, and sounds that the Servus Heritage Festival has to offer.

Each year as we celebrate this diversity, Edmonton's Food Bank is humbled by the continual outpouring of compassion by the community, irrespective of race or ethnicity. Hunger does not discriminate and thankfully neither does the willingness of so many wonderful Edmontonians and visitors to feed those in need.

BIRDS OF A FEATHER

In gratitude to Edmonton's Food Bank for providing meals and snacks to their students, this collaborative, travelling art project began with sketches based on the traditional Lenape legend "Rainbow Crow", created by kindergarten students at Florence Hallock School. From there the art arrived at Grade 4 classes at Lago Lindo School and Major-General Griesbach School where students added underpaintings and details using watercolours.

The art pieces then traveled to Grade 8 and 9 classes at Dickinsfield Jr. High School where block painting in acrylic was added. The final destination for each painting was Art class at Queen Elizabeth High School. These students added shading, texture and dimension, while Language Arts students contributed poetry in several different languages. Food Depot Highlight

FREEDOM CENTRE

“A place where the community gives back to itself,” is how Pam Beaver describes the food hamper depot at Freedom Centre Church. Every Wednesday morning 10-20 volunteers from the community gather to create a welcoming place for Food Bank clients to pick up their food resources. They have been doing so for over 17 years.

For Pam, who is a church member and the depot Director, it is a family affair with her father, son, daughter and now grandson all helping at the depot. Most of the other volunteers, however, are not church members but members of the Kennedale Community that is home to Freedom Centre. All those involved share the desire to help others in their community through difficult times. “We make ourselves available to encourage people,” says Pastor Merril Radford of the Freedom Centre.

The community also provides a clothing bank of donated items for those in need as well as a weekly Bread, Veggie and Grocery basket for those who come for food but have not arranged for a Food Bank hamper. At Christmas Edmonton’s Food Bank supplies food for the community Christmas Banquet that has been an annual celebration for 16 years. Everyone is welcome at the banquet, no matter their culture or religion. The Freedom Centre and the depot is a gathering place for the community and a place to visit with friends even when not in need of food resources.

The Freedom Centre is one of 48 depots throughout Edmonton, where community groups support their neighbours in need by volunteering a place for them to pick up their food hampers close to home.
